	every day for ten days until the
	very special day of Yom Kippur.
Simchat	End of the Jewish holiday which
	marks the end of the public Torah
	readings
Torah	The law of God.
Bimah	A raised platform in a synagogue,
	from which the Torah is read.
Synagogue	the building where Jewish people
	meet for religious worship and
	instruction.
Mezuzah	A parchment with religious texts
	and attached in a case to
	the doorpost of a Jewish house as
	a sign of faith.
Hebrew	Language used by people in
	modern Israel.
Yad	A Jewish ritual pointer
Shabbat	The day of rest.
