Key vocabulary and definitions:

Human geography	- the way humans effect and change the Earth
Physical geography	- the study of the natural features of Earth's surface
Farm	- an area of land and its buildings which are used for growing crops and raising animals
Continents	- the world is divided up into large areas of land. Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America, Australia, Antarctica
Plantation	- an estate on which crops such as coffee, sugar, and tobacco are grown.
